In the prior reporting year of 2019-2020, IFA facilitated \$10,575,687 of grants and contracts involving 34 faculty/staff members and 55 projects/applications. IFA grant/contract activity increased by 18% over the previous year in terms of number of projects and increased by 54% over the previous year in terms of total dollars involved.

# Food Family Farm Month – 2<sup>nd</sup> annual

 Even with no in-person events, the 2<sup>nd</sup> annual Food Family and Farm Month featured 30 JCAST events during the latter part of October and leading up to Thanksgiving. This is 5 more events than during the inaugural year. <u>FFF (fresnostate.edu)</u>

## 4. Outreach

- IFA Student Assistant Morgan Henson along with support from students Cameron
  Standridge and Victoria Tolin prepared Ag in a Bag as a new virtual learning experience
  for kids: Ag In A Bag (fresnostate.edu). A number of ag/ag science topics will be
  available via a virtual format featuring instruction and activities presented by Fresno
  State students. These are free and available to all with wifi access. There are some
  supplies associated with these activities. The supplies are readily available around most
  homes but are also being provided in an all inclusive bag for sale at the Gibson Farm
  Market for \$20.

- Dr. Pheasant and four master's/undergraduate students visited the Fairmont School in Sanger, CA to learn about their program in which all 600 K-8 students experience at least 1 hour/week of agricultural studies.

The 39th annual Agribusiness Management Conference (<u>Ag Business Conference</u> (<u>fresnostate.edu</u>) was held virtually and consisted of 7 sessions over a 4-week period within Food Family and Farm Month. Faculty, student, community, and ag industry experts addressed the following topics:

- United Nations Sustainability A Production Agriculture Perspective

Considerable student time effort was expended on reconfiguring the IFA website. It remains a work in progress. Given the pandemic conditions, no work was conducted on social media formats or newsletter. Given the university's in-progress revamp of the website look and feel, no work was done on a three centers portal. Interviews were conducted with about one dozen faculty actively involved in grant projects/research. These interviews are serving as the basis for faculty posters and postcards disseminated at the Gibson Farm Market. The posters feature faculty backgrounds, time at Fresno State, and research/outreach projects along with identifying their favorite ice cream flavor. The postcards typically feature a faculty member on one side and a student or recipe utilizing products grown on the University Agricultural Laboratory on the other.

  - Grant for the podcast/editing rooms was not awarded. Faculty/staff have since moved into those rooms. Re-applying for the grant was not deemed a priority for the next grant cycle.
